As Way Leads On To Way

"We're all travelers in this world. From the sweet grass to the packing house. Birth 'til death. We travel between the eternities."

- Robert Duvall as Prentice Ritter in Broken Trail.

Every now and again, because I spend time in the Bible and because I am a pastor and especially because times get hard, people ask me, "Do you think we are living in the end times?"

I know they're talking about the end of the world, so I smile, pastorally, and tell them the truth, as near as I can stand to it. "No."

Now they look at me like I'm blind, deaf, and ignorant to the world around us.

I could tell them what I know they want to hear. But it would be a lie, and the Bible tells us telling a lie is one of the ten biggies we don't want to get comfortable breaking. Believe me, it's easier to tell folks what they want to hear. Like when they test me, "This earth isn't my home. Don't you agree, pastor?" I think about the ten biggies and I tell them what I feel when I dig my ten toes into the dirt: "Well, it feels like home to me. After all, God created it and put me right here. Anyway, for me home is always where Marlene is."

Some folks laugh, because they think I'm telling a joke. But it's supper time, so I go find Marlene and we are at home.

I've spent a lot of time around death. I've lived long enough now to know everything has a birthing and everything has an ending. Yet, I don't make a hobby of endings. Unless you're talking about better times. In these COVID-19 days, better times cause me to stare way out at the horizon. Like John the Revelator, who wasn't concerned with the end of the world but catching a pretty intense vision of better times coming into his own hard times as he squeezed his ten toes into the sand on a Patmos beach.

There has never not been a time when folks asked, "Do vou think we're living in the end times?" Martin Gilbert wrote a three volume work on the 20th Century, devoting a chapter to each year. The final paragraphs of each chapter are devoted to the worst of the worst things that happened all over the world. Every year, these things caused folks to muse, "We must be living in the end times." Then a new year would start and they got hungry so they went back to work and making love and raising families.

Garrison Keillor shares such a moment of history in his 1. The Writer's Almanac, July 19, 2020. Writer's Almanac:

It was on this day 145 years ago, in 1875, that the largest recorded swarm of locusts in American history descended upon the Great Plains. It was a swarm about 1,800 miles long and 110 miles wide, from Canada down to Texas.

Swarms would occur once every seven to 12 years, emerging from river valleys in the Rockies and sweeping east across the country. The size of the swarms tended to grow when there was less rain and the West had been going through a drought since 1873. Farmers just east of the Rockies began to see a cloud approaching from the west. It was glinting around the edges where the locust wings caught the light of the sun.


People said the locusts descended like a driving snow in winter. They covered everything in their path. They sounded like thunder or a train and blanketed the ground, nearly a foot deep. Trees bent over with the weight of them. They are nearly every living piece of vegetation in their path. They ate harnesses off horses and the bark of trees, curtains, clothing that was hung out on laundry lines. They chewed on the handles of farm tools and fence posts and railings. Some farmers tried to scare away the locusts by running into the swarm, and they had their clothes eaten right off their bodies.

Similar swarms occurred in the following years. The farmers became desperate. But by the mid-1880s, the rains had returned, and the swarms died down. Within a few decades, the Rocky Mountain locusts were believed to be extinct. 1

Tough times. Enough to make farmers say, "It's the end of times!" But when they kept on breathing and getting hungry and finally felt a little cold at night, missing them clothes the locusts ate away, they got dressed and started plowing more rows.

I don't mean to make light of these things. After all, finding an ending can be just as holy as making a life. So sacred, we can get lost in "end times" and miss the beautiful, terrible life that is just as holy as any ending.

Perhaps the end is not near. Perhaps we must be at home and live long, believing somewhere between the sweet grass and the packing house, better days are a coming. Prentice Ritter, John the Revelator, Marlene and I: we are all with you, clinging toe-deep to the dirt until them better days arrive... - GT

We received \$17,445 from the PPP (Payroll Protection Program) on June 3rd. This loan was approved by the board at the May meeting.

With this loan, we should be able to cover the budget deficit which is anticipated to be (\$17,000) at the end of June.

When the proceeds are used to cover payroll costs, the loan will be forgiven.

Notes from Tim

One of the great hymns of the church is, "Great Is Thy Faithfulness." Of the many hymns we sing in church, this is probably one of my most favorite. The chorus says, "Great is thy faithfulness! Morning by morning new mercies I see; All I have needed thy hand hath provided - Great is thy faithfulness, Lord unto me!" It is taken from Lamentations 3:23, and it has been in my thoughts for the last few months. It is both a declaration and a reminder to me that each day God continues to be faithful to me and you despite our circumstances and God is still faithful to us and to His promises. He continues to show His faithfulness no matter what is going on presently in our lives and the world.

The composer of the text, Thomas Obadiah Chisolm (1866-1960) had a difficult early adult life. His health was so fragile that there were periods of time when he was confined to bed, unable to work. Between bouts of illness he would have to push himself to put in extra hours at various jobs in order to make ends meet. After coming to Christ at age 27, Thomas found great comfort in the Scriptures, and in the fact that God was faithful to be his strength in time of illness and weakness, and to provide his needs. While away from home on a missions trip, Thomas often wrote to one of his good friends, William Runyan, a relatively unknown musician. Several poems were exchanged in these letters. Runyan found one of Chisolm's poems so moving that he decided to compose a musical score to accompany the lyrics, Great is Thy Faithfulness was published in 1923. It was not until 1945 when George Beverly Shea began to sing Great is Thy Faithfulness at the Billy Graham evangelistic crusades, that the hymn was heard around the world.

Great is Thy faithfulness, O God my Father; There is no shadow of turning with Thee; Thou changest not, Thy compassions, they fail not; As Thou hast been, Thou forever will be.

Summer and winter and springtime and harvest, Sun, moon and stars in their courses above Join with all nature in manifold witness To Thy great faithfulness, mercy and love.

Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth Thine own dear presence to cheer and to guide; Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow, Blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside!

You and I can have joy during uncertain times because joy is not dependent on our circumstances. Joy comes

from a heart that trusts God and it produces praise no matter what things look like. Because God cares for us more than the birds of the air and the flowers in the field, we do not have to worry (Matthew 6:25-30). We can let our praises shape our cares into prayers (Philippians 4:6). Praising God during times like these remind us of His faithfulness and keep our eyes on Him. Each day gives Him the opportunity to provide for us, to show us His mercy and to prove His faithfulness. If we take time to look for those mercies and His faithfulness, we will see them. He will provide all you need even during a crisis because His faithfulness endures forever. God be with you. Tim




