
CWF NEWS

Notes from Tim

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by. Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting Light; The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

"O Little Town of Bethlehem" is one of my most favorite carols. We hear this carol and many others played all during the season, we hear carolers singing them on doorsteps, etc. --- we realize that we have heard and sang them all of our lives, yet sometimes we need to take a moment to stop and ponder the message relayed in each carol to really capture the true meaning and the wonderful affirmation of our Christian faith found in each of them ---why they were written, the heartfelt inspiration and emotion expressed as they were then penned by each composer. As we together sing "O Little Town of Bethlehem" in worship in the coming weeks I thought it would be meaningful to reveal some insight into the story behind this carol.

"O Little Town of Bethlehem" was written in 1868 by one of America's greatest preachers, Phillip Brooks. In his day he was referred to as "The Prince of the Pulpit." The carol was written several years after he returned from a trip to the Holy Land. The experience of spending Christmas Eve in Bethlehem and worshipping in the Church of the Nativity made an unforgettable impression upon the young preacher. Three years later, while pastor at the Holy Trinity Church in Philadelphia, Brooks decided to compose a Christmas text to use at a children's Christmas program.

He wrote about his Holy Land experience:

On Christmas Eve, as I was walking down the streets of Jerusalem, I felt the need to get away from the masses of people who crowded the village streets. I borrowed a horse and spent time wandering, lost in thought. Just as the sun was setting, I rode into the tiny little town of Bethlehem and the clear sky became full of stars. Awed by the wonder of the scene and how our Savior came from such humble beginnings, my faith was truly inspired!

It was this lasting memory of his Holy Land visit that inspired Brooks to write this carol. Brooks, along with the organist at the church, composed a simple and pretty melody that children could sing. This carol was an immediate favorite with children and adults around the world. It was first published in 1874 and has been one of the most cherished carols of all time. Brooks died unexpectedly in 1893. A child, when told by her mother that Bishop Brooks had gone to heaven, exclaimed, "Oh, Mama, how happy the angels will be!" (Continued next column)

O holy Child of Bethlehem! Descend to us, we pray; Cast out our sin, and enter in; Be born in us today. We hear the Christmas angels the great glad tidings tell; O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel.

May the joy, the love, and the blessings of Christ's holy birth renew each of our hearts and minds!
