



A NOTE FROM RODNEY

In Germany, they came first for the Communist. I did not speak out because I'm not a Communist. Then, they came for the Jews. I did not speak because I am not a Jew. Then, they came to fetch the workers, members of the trade unions. I did not say anything because I was not a trade unionist. Afterwards, they came for the Catholics. I did not say anything because I was a Protestant. Eventually, they came for me, and there was no one left to speak.

Over the years I have found this quote of Martin Niemöller, to speak to me in various ways. As we prepare to go to the polls this fall, it spoke to me again.

Beginning in the 1920's Niemöller was a prominent Lutheran pastor in Germany, who supported various radical political movements. In his early years he sympathized with many Nazi ideas. However, Nazi persecution quickly expanded to harm a variety of others, including Niemöller himself. Most Germans did not object to Nazi actions. Rather, they either supported the regime or ignored the pain of their fellow citizens.

After the war, Niemöller traveled widely and publicly confessed his inaction and indifference to the fate of many victims. His words served as a model of how to accept personal responsibility for complicity in the Nazi regime.

From the first sermon I shared at PCC to the present Sunday, I have never preached specifically on political candidates. Don't worry - my silence on specifics won't change now. "Who" is a decision each of us must make.

But the "Why" is a different matter. As Christians we must not be silent. It is important that as followers of Jesus we PRAY for guidance, and let our faith speak. We must VOTE for the leaders of our country and community who we believe will best serve us according to the teachings and life of Jesus. Regardless of the election's outcome, we are called to seek the welfare of our community.

After we choose them, we are called to **PRAY** for our leaders. Blessings PCC! **Rodney**

Notes From Tim

Let Us With a Gladsome Mind!

When I was a Junior at Davie High School back in 1975, I chose to take as one of my electives, a "Major British Writers" class. It was an in-depth study into the works of Chaucer, Dickens, Blake, Milton, Wordsworth, Shelley, and of course, Shakespeare, as well as several others. The details of many of these writings have waned from my memory over these last forty-seven years since that class, but at this Season of Thanksgiving I still recall one of John Milton's poetic works that I have always admired. It is based on verses 1, 2, 7, and 23 from Psalm 136, that reminds us that God's love, mercy, and kindness endures forever.

Milton wrote this poem in 1623 when he was only 15 years of age while a pupil in St. Paul's School in London. It contains twenty-six verses of which I will share only four.

Let us with a gladsome mind praise the Lord for He is kind: For His mercies shall endure, ever faithful, ever sure.

He, with all-commanding might filled the newmade world with light: For His mercies shall endure, ever faithful, ever sure.

All things living He doth feed; His full hand supplies their need: For His mercies shall endure, ever faithful, ever sure.

Let us then with gladsome mind praise the Lord, for He is kind: For His mercies shall endure. ever faithful, ever sure.

A gladsome, joyous mind is the product of a grateful, praising heart. Gratefulness is the opposite of selfishness. The grateful Christian realizes that all achievements and blessings come only from God's bountiful hand. This realization results in a life of praise.

Far too often our prayer life consists only of a series of personal requests. God wants our requests, but He also desires to hear our praise for His eternal kindness and love in response to our daily needs.

On Thanksgiving Sunday, November 20, the Chancel Choir will sing this text as an anthem at the morning worship service! Blessings, **Tim**
