# 2023 CROP HUNGER WALK

October 15, 2023, is the Annual Crop Walk that our church participates in. It is a program sponsored by Church World Service (which is an ecumenical ministry of 37 Christian denominations and communities working in partnership to eradicate hunger and poverty and promote peace and justice around the world.) CWS is a 501(c)(3) not for profit.

CROP Hunger Walks are community led interfaith events that raise funds to end hunger locally and around the world. From the beginning of these walks in 1969, they have grown to include walkers of all ages, faiths and backgrounds in more than 500 communities throughout the United States. From this walk in Winston-Salem, 12 1/2 % of the funds raised will go to Crisis Control and 12 1/2 % to Sunnyside Ministries. The remaining 75% will be distributed globally where needed. CROP hunger walkers raise more than \$6 million annually to bring help and hope to those who need it most.

The walk will begin at 2:30 p.m. on October 15 at Corpening Plaza downtown. It is a fun walk - go at your own pace- and walk with a friend or our group or alone- whichever you wish. Every walker will be given an orange tee shirt when he/she checks in. Please sign up on the sheet on the front table in the Narthex. If you don't feel able to walk, please consider making a contribution by donating either by check or cash. Checks should be made out to CWS/CROP. You may give your donation to any walker.

# Notes from Tim

Perhaps one of the most commonly used hymns sung on World Communion Sunday is "Let Us Break Bread Together."

Let us bread together on our knees. Let us break bread together on our knees. When I fall on my knees with my face to the rising sun, O Lord have mercy on me.

Let us drink wine together on our knees. Let us drink wine together on our knees. When I fall on my knees with my face to the rising sun, O Lord have mercy on me.

Many spirituals were formed in the West African Gullah/Geechee slave culture that later developed in the coastal areas of South-Eastern colonial America, including St. Helena Island, Beaufort, and Charleston, South Carolina. At that time, slaves most often attended worship service in the Episcopal Churches. Their worship was usually held early in the morning at sunrise. Episcopal church altars were often positioned on an east-west axis. Thus, when someone knelt at the communion rail they were facing East, towards the sunrise. For those attuned to Revelation, it also meant they were looking in the general direction from which Christ would return.

The song itself gives us several reminders of the nature of communion and how we should partake of it. Our attitude should be one of *being on our knees*. It implies an attitude of humility. It is recognition that He is God and we are not; we owe our salvation to him, He is not indebted to us.

Mentally, we are to have our *face to the sun* — that is, looking at the Light of the World. We seek his enlightenment, his comfort and his guidance. We do so in the process of acknowledging our debt to him.

We call him "Lord." Never forget that if you are a Christian you are professing Jesus Christ as your Lord as well as your Savior and you owe him your obedience.

Finally, the chorus ends with *Lord have mercy on me*. In communion we explicitly ask our Lord for the forgiveness of our sins based not upon our virtues but upon his loving grace. We ask for what he freely gives: *mercy*.

Look forward to worshipping with you this Sunday as we celebrate World Communion together! Tim
